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RESEARCH PROFILE

Linguist specialising in the history and languages of the Middle East and North Africa, with a focus on language politics, media and communication, discourse analysis, and identity formation in postcolonial contexts. My research examines how linguistic practices intersect with nationalism, political humour, and media discourse, particularly in Jordan and the broader MENA region. I work across Arabic and Tamazight-speaking communities, with regional focus on Jordan and Algeria. Methodologically, I draw on critical discourse analysis, linguistic ethnography, and sociolinguistic approaches, integrating oral narratives and archival materials to explore how language mediates state formation, cultural production, and modes of belonging.

Linguistic and Discourse-Focused Research

• Language, Humour, and Far-Right Discourse in Post-Arab Spring Jordan

Analyses on the discursive construction of far-right ideologies in Jordanian political humour after 2011, focusing on linguistic strategies that reflect and reproduce authoritarian and nationalist tropes.

• Hybridity and Language Ideologies in Postcolonial Algeria (w/ Dr Imene Medfouni, Middle East University, Jordan)

Explores language ideologies and educational language policy among the Chaoui Imazighen, tracing how linguistic hybridity can shape identity and cultural memory in post-independence Algeria.

• Mediated Language and Neutrality Discourses in Jordanian Media (w/ Dr Jona Fras, University of Edinburgh, UK)

Examines discursive shifts in Jordanian media coverage of regional and international wars (Palestine, Iraq, Syria, Ukraine, etc.), analysing how language can be used to negotiate neutrality, nationalism, and state positioning.

• Language, Youth and Social Transitions in 1950s–70s Jordan

Uses oral history and discourse analysis to investigate how youth in post-independence navigated education, mobility, and modernity, focusing on the linguistic practices and identity formation.

Analyses how language and state discourse frame regional instability, refugee flows, energy and water scarcity in Jordan, focusing on the role of rhetorical strategies and political language.

• Jordanian Media Discourse on the Syrian Regime Transition

Investigates how Jordanian media discourse constructs narratives of the Syrian crisis and Assad's fall, focusing on metaphors, framing and ideological positioning in public language.
